### FLOWERING NOW

With the cooler weather, buds are growing and some are bursting into flowers. The small plants include *Acacia stenoptera* with spherical, yellow flowers and *Calectasia grandiflora* (Blue Tinsel Lily), both widespread. Small shrubs with some flowers are *Jacksonia sternbergiana* and *Gompholobium tomentosum* – both peas. A tree, currently with magnificent flowers, is *Banksia menziesii*. A bit of rain soon should accelerate flowering.

## GRANTS TO THE FRIENDS OF WIRELESS HILL

The Friends work all over the Park but since 2009 we have had an agreement with the City of Melville that we will be responsible for handweeding the area on the left below.



You may have noticed signs around the Park for the Swan Alcoa Landcare Program (SALP).



Funding from this Program has enabled the Friends of Wireless Hill to employ qualified bushcare workers to assist us with hand weeding. Since receiving our first SALP grant in 2011 we have worked in partnership with SERCUL (South East Region Centre for Urban Landcare with Tracy Evans as the SERCUL team leader.

Since 2013 the Friends have also taken responsibility for hand weeding the adjacent area, between the footpath to Davy Street and the Council offices, shown below.



We were fortunate to receive SALP funding for March 2016 to March 2017 and we have now commenced work using the SALP grant received for March 2017 to March 2018.

Since 2011 the Friends have also received Commonwealth Department of Environment and Conservation and State NRM (Natural Resource Management) funding. We are currently working on a NRM funded project as well as the SALP funded project.
